Understanding Your Fire Safety Training Requirements

As a compulsory requirement of the regulatory reform (Fire Safety) Order 2005 (RRO), staff training is often considered a burden on an organisation and can therefore be a weakness within the workforce. More often than not, a workplace fire is caused by employer or employee actions whether through carelessness or lack of knowledge. A little information in the form of fire safety training can go a long way.

Legislation

The RRO might arguably be vague in its assertion of what is required from the organisation in terms of fire safety training. Words such as 'adequate', 'suitable' and 'sufficient' are common within the Order and open to wide interpretation. A wise course of action then is to establish what is specifically required for the individual organisation according to the Order. A useful resource may be found in the British Standard BS9999: 2008.

Responsibility

The party responsible for deciding what actions are needed is known as the "Responsible Person". This is typically the manager, owner or operator. Training is one aspect of the responsible persons duties and whilst it might appear simple here, the process of breaking down problems and providing solutions to their component parts can be a complicated process. Yet there is a simple answer, training. As the manager of a site, responsibility is often delegated by default, as those are the people who are deemed to be in control. In this instance, The Fire Safety (Employees' Capabilities) (England) Regulations 2010 might be said to suggest that training for the Responsible Person role is essential.

Here's how it all went wrong...£150,000 later

Last year a huge retail store in Oxford Street, London suffered at the hands of a fire. Luckily no one in the store was injured but unfortunately this was due more to luck than judgement. After an inspection of the premises and fire safety arrangements it was noted that levels of staff training for fire safety were woefully inadequate. Staff failed to act when the fire alarm sounded, the alarm was even turned it off so customers could continue shopping. The alarm triggered again and staff still failed to react. It was only when passers by shouted warnings that panic set in and the call to get out went up. The fine incurred was £400,000. £150,000 of this was due to the fact that staff received inadequate training.
